Applicant Brief



Migrant Voice is commissioning trainers to develop a series of migrant heritage-themed exhibitions and publications created with people who have made Scotland their home.

Project overview:

Putting Ourselves in the Picture explores and shares the heritage, experiences, and contributions of those who have made Scotland their home. The project creates opportunities for people to interact and get to know one another through collaborative exhibitions, publications, and multicultural events. All throughout, participants will have a chance to take part in training that will enable them to develop and share their stories with the wider community. The project is led by Migrant Voice with funding from Heritage Fund.

Scope of the role:

Trainer(s) will prepare and deliver a series of 2-hour sessions for project participants as well as providing ongoing 1:1 support. Participants will be of diverse ethnic backgrounds and are likely to involved people speaking limited English. Support with communication and facilitation will be provided by the project coordinator. Based on participants' input, the trainer(s) will finalize the output of their activity so that it fits the migrant heritage theme and contributes to enhanced community cohesion.

The sessions should cover the following:

- 1. Explore their arrival and settling in Scotland and unpicking key events in their lives that contributed to their community, which we see as heritage today.
 - Including, but not limited to:
- What occupation the individual had
- The people they interacted with
- The feelings at the start of their arrival
- What they had to learn to survive or succeed
- The difference they believed they made
- How the community changed as a result of their contribution
- Any sacrifices they made along the way
- Places of significance to individuals
- 2. Develop skills in cultural story-telling via photography, illustration, and other means. Including, but not limited to:
- Taking pictures of their own items where these would help to convey their heritage

- Learning to digitise their previous photos, so these can be reproduced for future story-telling
- Creating draft story-boards of their heritage stories, which can be built into a future narrative and/or exhibition.
- Creating illustrations for their stories
- Creating compelling written and spoken accounts of their heritage, experiences and contributions
- 3. **Create a story of their own heritage**, particularly where such heritage has contributed to the community. Such a story must be fit for exhibiting to members of the public, both in person and online. Including, but not limited to:
- Selecting appropriate colour schemes and materials that would shape the exhibit
- Learning how to work with materials and content to convey the story
- Placement of content, including any physical objects.

Sessions must take place within the project timeline, as described below.

- ILLUSTRATION approx. 3 workshops between January and March, ready to exhibit in March/April 2023
- PHOTOGRAPHY approx. 8 workshops between February to September, ready to exhibit in December 2023

Our rates are based on the Scottish Artists Union rates of pay.
